RESULTS OF AIR QUALITY TESTING AND DATA

At the meeting on Tuesday, May 11th, the Ohio EPA released the results of the air quality monitoring it had been conducting in Winton Hills and Spring Grove Village from December 2018 through May 2019. Both the EPA and the Ohio Department of Health concluded that the air quality posed no health risks. Although there were no health risks found, they will continue to do more testing during the summer to see if it varies. Additionally, because Cincinnati has a noxious nuisance ordinance, they will see if it applies to any of the complaints that have been heard before. In the meantime, you can see the data results at the South West Air Quality Agency link,

http://www.southwestohioair.org/monitoring/winton_terrace. On this webpage, there is a map of the actual route taken during the loop tests. You can also see the test results data from each loop test (test by test and month by month). Beneath the link for these test results, you will see the results of the 24 hour test samples along with their analysis done by ALS Environmental (an independent company). Please note the following may prove helpful in understanding the results. The annotation "ppbv" means parts per billion volume (volume being how you measure gases such as air). Also, "ug/m3" means micrograms per cubic meter. "TO-15 BY GC/MS" refers to the EPA method of testing Toxic Organics (method 15) to determine the amount of Volatile Organic Compounds in the air collected by specially prepared canisters analyzed by Gas Chromatography/Mass Spectrometry.

I hope this helps answer some of your questions.

PROPERTY TAXES (THE CONTINUING SAGA)

The Property Tax Group held their fifth workshop on June 20 and the format of this meeting was different from prior workshops. Because the treasurer from Cincinnati Public Schools was making a presentation regarding tax revenue and needs (which was lengthy), community members were not allowed to ask questions or voice concerns unless they were one of the invited working group members. (The funding for the schools versus enrollment and the current flat contribution of 5 million versus full rate from tax abatement is too complicated to go into it here. You can read more about it in the community council report in the January 2019 SGV newsletter archives. The City and CPS are currently renegotiating this agreement.)

One of the biggest problems is when legacy owners see their property tax increase three or four fold because the area they live in has gentrified. Some homeowners are actually being forced to sell and move. Different solutions were put forth at this meeting. The question of whether abatement are helping the city's rank and file or only the developers was addressed. This problem is directly tied to the one above regarding legacy owners. When developers buy perfectly good older homes then tear them down and get the bare lot revalued for taxes only to build a McMansion and heavily tax abate it, how is this benefiting the city's bottom line or the senior living next door who sees his tax rate double or triple? In many cases, the person with the six figure income who bought the half a million dollar McMansion with a 70% abatement is paying less tax than the fixed income senior next door whose \$120k home has been revalued at \$250k without any abatement. I really wanted to know what the Ohio Tax Incentive Review Council thought about this (because it is their job to review it), but was not allowed to speak.



Frequently Asked Questions!

- How can I report a pothole? Just visit <u>5916000.com</u> or call (513) 591-6000. The customer service office is open Monday through Friday from 7:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.
- What if I see a dead animal in the road? Please fill out a Customer Service Request by selecting the "Bugs, Pest, and Animals" category and filling out the appropriate form.
- Who do I contact to get my street swept? The City schedules streets to be swept using a quarterly schedule. If you have a special request, please fill out a Customer Service Request by selecting the "Streets, Street Lights and Sidewalks" category and filling out the appropriate form.
- How can I report damage from a pothole or City equipment? To file a claim, please contact Customer Service at (513) 591-6000. Please make note of the date, time, address, and equipment number of any City equipment involved. Pothole damage will need a specific address, description of the lane (ex: inbound, outbound, curb lane, etc.), along with any insurance damage claims.
- Where do I report street light or signal outages? If a traffic signal is out or malfunctioning, please call (513) 591-6000. For street lights, either the City or Duke Energy will be responsible for maintaining the light. Please fill out a Customer Service Request by selecting the "Streets, Street Lights and Sidewalks" category and filling out the appropriate form.
- Who do I contact for downed overhead lines? Duke Energy, Cincinnati Bell or Time Warner may need to be contacted depending what has fallen.

- Who do I contact regarding road blockages, mud slides, wall failures and trees blocking in the roadway? Please call (513) 591-6000 for urgent roadway issues.
- Who do I contact regarding bed bugs? Please fill out a Customer Service Request by selecting the "Bugs, Pests and Animals" category and filling out the appropriate form. Your question or concern will be sent to the Health Department.
- Who do I report an abandoned or illegally parked car? If the vehicle is abandoned, please fill out a Customer Service Request by selecting the "Abandoned Vehicles" category and filling out the appropriate form. If the vehicle is illegally parked, please contact the Police Department.
- How do I report a nuisance property with tall grass or litter? Please fill out a Customer Service Request by selecting "Trees, Grass & Weeds" or "Trash, Litter & Recycling" and filling out the appropriate form. Your question or concern will be sent to Litter Patrol.
- Who do I contact regarding building issues? Please fill out a Customer Service Request by selecting "Building Problems" and filling out the appropriate form. Your request will be sent to the appropriate department, depending on the type of issue.
- How do I schedule a news interview? Interviews are scheduled through each department depending on time or weather conditions. Each department has its own contact liaisons. City press releases are sent through the City Manager's Office. Please contact Casey Weldon (casey.weldon@cincinnati-oh.gov) for further Information regarding city press releases.

Garbage Guidelines

Garbage must be placed in a City-issued or "City-approved" cart. A "City-approved" cart is one that is compatible with DPS lifting equipment and registered with the City. These carts must have a lift pocket and a steel lower lift bar for fully automated and semi-automated collection systems. Garbage in carts is not to exceed 75 lbs.

DPS is not responsible for damages to cart due to normal collection operation. The City of Cincinnati will not collect garbage in a cart that is not compatible with the City's lifting equipment and not registered with the City of Cincinnati.

Note: In the City of Cincinnati, trash is picked-up each week while recycling and yard waste are collected every-other week, on the same day as the regular trash collection.
